#### THE GRANTS

#### **Planning & Design Matching Grant**

- Awarded \$50,000 in 2014
- Spanned two years 2014-2016
- A "stepping stone" grant

#### **Public Library Construction Project Grant**

- Application submitted for January 26, 2017
- Competitive, multi-year award cycle by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners
- Potential \$7.85 million award and construction in approximately 2021-22, pending future Town votes

Thirty years after the most recent library addition, the current library is constrained to find the space to put "the public" in the public library!



#### THE BACK-STORY

Since 2001, the Library Trustees have been engaged in longterm planning for future space enhancement:

- 2001 -Space Re-Allocation Study conducted Tied into the Town Septic System 2006 -Initial meeting with the PTBC 2008 -Toured new Library Buildings began LBP 2009 -2012 -Completed mandatory Community Survey and submitted the Library 2014-2018 Long Range Plan to MBLC With Town Meetings' approval/support, applied 2014 for and received a matching Planning & Design Grant
- 2017 After 4 Town Meeting votes, submitted MPLCP grant

#### THE NEED

Our current building footprint is inadequate to meet the needs of the residents who use it most, lacking:

- An ample, imaginative, responsive Children's Area
- Teen Space reflecting new technology and trends
- Sufficient study, research and tutorial spaces
- Collaborative working, conference and community gathering spaces
- Family Bathroom with space for a caregiver, a stroller, a toddler and an infant
- Space to rock a fussy baby
- Energy-efficient, current building systems
- Code- and safety-compliant public areas



#### THE LIBRARY FACILITY NEEDS COMMITTEE

From December 2014, the Library Facility Needs Committee met 36 times to achieve the targets of the Planning & Design Grant. The Library Facility Needs Committee has:

- Completed a comprehensive MBLC Library Building Program
- Hired an Owners Project Manager and the Architectural Firm
- Considered 5 alternate sites
- Considered multiple design options
- Conducted surveying, wetlands delineation, test boring and geotechnical testing
- Conducted a Hazardous Materials Survey
- Hired two independent Cost Estimators to calculate estimated project costs
- ☐ Met with multiple Town Boards, Technical Review Staff and Commissions

# PLANNING & DESIGN GRANT DELIVERABLES


- 1. A library building program
- 2. **Schematic drawings and plans** (or more complete drawings as available) prepared by a Massachusetts registered architect, and bearing his or her stamp, including:
  - a. Floor plan with a complete furnishing and equipment layout.
  - b. **Elevations** as appropriate.
  - c. **Tabulation of square footages** called for in the library building program statement and comparison to the square footages shown on the architectural plans.
  - d. Tabulations of the number of books, magazines and audio-visual materials called for in the library building program in comparison to the square footages shown on the architectural plans.
  - e. **Tabulations of the number of seats and staff work spaces** called for in the library building program in comparison to the square footages shown on the architectural plans.
- 3. **Preliminary project budget**, prepared independently by an experienced professional cost estimator, based on the site plan, building plans and construction budget.
- 4. **Site plan** prepared by a Massachusetts registered architect with parking, grading, building location and designation of utilities (1" = 40 feet or larger).
- 5. **Geotechnical survey**, including soil boring and perc tests (as appropriate) certified by a licensed professional providing a thorough subsurface soil analysis to document the appropriateness of the site for construction and existing special conditions.
- 6. A **stamped topographic land survey**, completed within 15 years of the application, delineating boundary lines for entire site to be included in the library building project.
- 7. Map showing existing and, if different, selected future library site.
- 8. Pictures of site and building.

## GRANTS & GIFTS, PAST & FUTURE

The Library has maximized the local tax dollar by pursuing two state-funded grants – the Planning & Design Grant [2014-2016] and the competitive Massachusetts Public Library Construction Program Grant for which Westford is waitlisted to receive just under \$8 million. The Westford Library has a strong history of gifts, donations, benefactors and grants:

- 1797 the Social Library was founded by 25 citizens
- 1859 the Social Library was donated to the Town
- 1873 the Agricultural Library was donated to the Town
- 1895 Jonathan Varnum Fletcher donated 75% of the funds to build a new library on the Common
- 1963 J. V. Fletcher's great grand-daughter Marian Winnek funded a basement Children's Room
- 1969 Renovation/addition funded by federal LSCA Title II grant
- 1979 Bookmobile funded by federal LSCA Title I grant
- 1988 Renovation/addition awarded MPLCP grant award
- 2007-12 Library Beautification funded by Friends of the Library fundraising
- 2017 Wait listed for MPLCP grant award





## ESTIMATED PROJECT COST

Westford is currently #10 on the MPLCP Grant Wait List. Once a provisional grant award is announced in the future, Westford has a six-month window to approve funding via a ballot and Town Meeting vote. Assuming Westford may be wait-listed until 2021, four years of cost escalation is being projected and included in the budget. At that point, the library project cost breakdown is estimated to be:

Town Bond	\$12.6 M
MBLC Grant	\$ 7.8 M
Private Funds/CPA	\$ 1.5 M
<b>Total Project Cost</b>	\$21.9 M

The Town Bond would equal \$102.05 on the average, assessed household, or \$1.97 per week. Payment for this project should coincide with reductions in the Town's future debt schedule.
